Labour of love as hill footpath is restored - mostly by hand!

THE COMPLETION of an upgrading project to Aberdeenshire's famous landmark Bennachie was marked by a special reception this week.

The well-known Garioch hill has benefited from a major £122,000 investment in access improvement over the past year and the final stage of upgrading and renewing the Rowantree footpath was marked by a reception on Tuesday at Macdonald Pittodrie House Hotel.

Theo Smith, whose family has been involved with the estate for over 100 years, officially opened the footpath in the presence of Scottish Natural Heritage's Captain Robin Middleton, Gordon MSP Nora Radcliffe senior bailie James MacKay and representatives from funding partners.

Macdonald Pittodrie House

initiated and supported the project in partnership with Scottish Natural Heritage (30 per cent), Grampian Enterprise Scotland (four per cent), Forestry Commission-(eight per cent), and Aberdeenshire Council with EU Objective 5b (50 per cent).

Main contractors, Highland Conservation Services, worked through difficult winter conditions and foot and mouth restrictions to complete the path to the highest standards. Due to the sensitive nature of the high elevation site, much of the work had to be carried out by hand, minimising disturbance to adjacent moorland.

Using granite sourced at nearby Kemnay Quarry and airlifted onto site, the final section required the laying of a pitched pavement to the summit of Mither Tap to endure the erosive conditions.

In total 2,720m of paths have been improved, building on other footpath improvements carried out by the Forestry Commission on Bennachie in recent years.

Said Mrs Radcliffe: "Bennachie is one of the natural landmarks of Aberdeenshire and it has always been a popular destination for walkers.

"This project of restoration will allow people to enjoy the walk to Mither Tap for many years to come.

"It was a pleasure to be invited to see the excellent work which has been done and to learn more about the project itself.

"Everyone involved in the restorations must be congratulated on their hard work and thanked for all their efforts, efforts from which many thousands of people will benefit.
