autumn.

The inaugural sod was cut this

week on the first major information centre on the Garioch landmark. But the Bailies of Bennachie and others with an interest in the ancient

site and its wildlife are concerned over access. "There is no guarantee the new Bennachie Centre might not be landlocked in the forest," said Bailies of Bennachie founder mem-

ber Algy Watson, of Oyne.

"No one will know until we finally

hear the working group's report. We are all in the dark." "If this land was sold with an access agreement then the asking price could be cut by 50%," said Mr

Watson. "The implications of that fact are obvious. It is worrying." Gordon MP Malcolm Bruce said around 100,000 people visited Bennachie annually. "The possi-

bility that the future privatisation of

the Forestry Commission will stor

people having access is totally un-acceptable." The MP vowed his support to the Bailies. He said he had written Scottish Office Minister for Agriculture and the Environment Sir Hector Monro seeking a firm pledge on continued "free and open

access" across Bennachie. "The Scottish Office seems quite happy to sell off parts of Scotland for a fast buck, and don't seem to care that people will be denied

access to enjoy their own country."
